O'Neill's \$5. budget bars

HARTFORD - Gov. William A. O'Neill says it would be ''irresponsible'' to propose state tax cuts that would increase the tax burden of local governments.

He made that comment during a press conference at the State Capitol several hours before he was to formally recom-mend a \$5.6 billion 1987-88 state budget to the General Assem-

bly.

Reacting to Republican criticism that there isn't enough tax cuts in his proposal, O'Neill said "it would be irresponsible to play to the public by talking about massive tax cuts and throw it on the backs of the local governments."
